Shortly after returning home, Elizabeth, his wife, conceived. Then, about six months later, Mary conceived Jesus (Luke 1:26-36), which would place Jesus' birth around September or early October.

4. Connection to the Feast of Tabernacles

Some propose that Jesus may have been born during the Feast of Tabernacles, a joyful autumn festival celebrating God dwelling with His people (Leviticus 23:33-43). This would align with the symbolism of Jesus as "Emmanuel," or "God with us" (Matthew 1:23), and with John's statement, "The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us" (John 1:14). If Jesus was born in late September or early October, this would fit with the Feast of Tabernacles.

Summary

Considering these factors, many scholars believe Jesus was likely born in the early fall, around September or October, rather than December. This would align well with the timing of Jewish festivals, the shepherds in the fields, and the priestly schedule of Zechariah.

ME Ok watch this, The Shepherds are only out in the fields during the spring time that is when the lambing season was and they are charged with protecting the new born lambs thus was the reason they were told first.

The Shepherds were told to go be by our Lords side to protect Him just like they do for the new born lambs, Christ is our Passover Lamb.

The Lord could not have been born during the Feast of Tabernacles because of the Emperors Census. All Hebrew men were required to be at three of our Lords Feasts. The Feast of Tabernacles being one of them, a census would conflict with this requirement thus causing an uprising and the Romans were very aware of this fact, so they would not call for a census during a major Hebrew Feast.

The priestly division of Abijah was not on the same time of the year all the time, I studied this issue so it is very likely that Zachariah's time to serve in the Temple could have aligned with Christ being born in Bethlehem in the Spring time with all the other Passover Lambs.... ABBA Father is a God of perfect order...
